

SEPTEMBER SERMON SERIES: THROUGH DEEP WATERS

During the month of September, Pastor Mark will focus on belonging. One aspect of our common humanity we all share: we yearn to be a part of something beyond ourselves. We are innately created to be social creatures. Science has given us ways to understand this genetic impulse inside us. The Bible has also given us ways to understand this soulful desire from deep within. And through the waters of Baptism, the church builds upon both of these amazing blueprints to help us better understand our longing to belong.





On Sunday, September 24, following worship, the church will host an opportunity to learn more about our Life Group Ministry. We will also be forming and launching new life groups so this is a chance to get involved! Attending the Lunch & Launch doesn't obligate you to join a Life Group. You can just come to listen and learn about how Life Groups can enhance your friendships and your faith and then decide.

But just what are Life Groups? Life Groups are small groups in which members share their lives with one another in a comfortable, non-threatening, supportive and prayerful environment. They're designed to help build and strengthen our relationships with each other and with Jesus, and to help us apply a growing faith to our everyday lives.

Consider giving a Life Group a try. God never meant for us to do life alone. We were created to walk with each other, to grow with one another and to glorify God together.

FROM PASTOR JESSICA

I was baptised on August 8, 1971, at Pilgrim Presbyterian, a place where my grandmother's aunts worshipped all their lives. There was a single rose bud placed on the altar. Afterwards, my family celebrated the day and my grandmother's 51st birthday at a local restaurant. Of course, I don't remember any of this because I was only 8 months old. I only know these details because my mother would remind me throughout my childhood. My mother did not grow up in church and had only just embraced a faith in Christ. Her fledgling acts were sincere and laid a foundation for both of our lives. She was going through very hard times. Her five year marriage had come to a devastating end, she lost a house she designed herself and loved, and she was in the middle of what would become a four year battle with my father just to settle their assets, etc.

The light during this time was Jesus. She had heard about Him from a friend, Grace Aicher, and began to learn about, lean on, and love Him. My mother would be baptised a few years later in the Jordan River. One day when she was telling me the story of her baptism, I found grace too and knelt down beside her bed to ask Jesus to be my Savior and friend.

This month as we study "Through Deep Waters," I will again remember my baptism and all the things that Jesus has done for me, my family, and others. Join me, the water is fine.

BACKPACK PACKING EVENT: SEPT. 17






CONGRATS TO OUR SCHOLARSHIP RECIPIENTS

1. John Wesley rode far enough on horseback to circle the earth 10 times.

Wesley rode 250,000 miles! He was convinced that it was important for him personally to spread the gospel through relationships and continue to grow closer to God in those relationships. Asked if he would consider walking instead of riding, he replied, "Nay."

2. Wesley believed you could not be a Christian on your own.

He said that we needed to be involved in "social holiness." Though some often think this term is synonymous with "social justice," its meaning is quite different. Wesley believed we could only grow as Christians in community. In his preface to the 1739 hymnal, he was adamant that "the gospel of Christ knows of no religion but social; no holiness but social holiness."

3. John Wesley coined the term "agree to disagree."

Over the years, Wesley had serious theological differences with another popular pastor named George Whitefield. Though they both argued passionately, Wesley reflected on these differences in a 1770 memorial sermon for Whitefield by saying: "There are many doctrines of a less essential nature. ... In these, we may think and let think; we may 'agree to disagree.' But, meantime, let us hold fast the essentials. ..." This appears to be the first recorded use of the term. It was a hallmark of Wesley's way of holding to his convictions while remaining in connection with those with whom he disagreed.

4. Wesley had serious doubts about his faith.

Almost everyone has questions about their faith at some point or another. Doubts are essential to the process of making any belief system one's own. They do not mean that one will ultimately lose it. In fact, even as Wesley struggled with deep doubts about faith, he followed the wise instruction of a mentor who told him to "preach faith till you have it; and then, because you have it, you will preach faith." Even as we struggle, we can maintain our hold on the truths we question until we can settle all our doubts.

5. "Methodist" was originally a derogatory term.

The details of the origins of the term "Methodist" are in dispute, but one thing is clear. It was originally used by outsiders to mock John Wesley and his early societies because of their dedication to following a method for growing closer to God. They ended up accepting the term, considering it a positive descriptor of their movement. Way to own it, Methodists!



6. Wesley never intended to split from the Church of England.

However, when the revolution happened in the American colonies, most of the Anglican priests returned home. Faced with the fact that none of the Methodists in the colonies could receive the sacraments, Wesley ordained ministers whom he sent to do the same in America (he was practical even when it caused problems). That act was the beginning of the separation that formed the Methodist Church in America. The Methodist Church in England did not officially form until after Wesley's death.

7. Wesley counseled people to "eat a little less than you desire."

Staying slim was far from Wesley's goal, though he did weigh in around 128 pounds. This was not the result of dieting, but rather of a practice to ensure that people were not ruled by their natural desires but exercising control over them.

8. Wesley never said this famous quote attributed to him.

It has been on the back of more than one United Methodist youth camp T-shirt: "Do all the good you can, by all the means you can, in all the ways you can, in all the places you can, at all the times you can, as long as ever you can." Though the quote is often attributed to John Wesley and is consistent with his perspective on life, many historians have confirmed there is no record of Wesley ever saying that.

9. Methodism grew from four to 132.000 members in Wesley's lifetime.

The beginning of Methodism was a group of four who called themselves the "holy club" at Oxford. When Wesley died in 1791, <u>he left behind a movement</u> with 72,000 members in the British Isles and 60,000 in America.

10. John Wesley wrote one of the all-time bestselling medical texts.

Wesley was deeply convicted that God is concerned about our earthly life as well as our heavenly one. To that end, he wrote a medical text for the everyday person titled Primitive Physick. You can read the <u>full version</u> online and it's pretty interesting. The book detailed the current knowledge about home remedies and went through 32 editions, making it one of the most widely read books in England. Many of <u>Wesley's cures and tips on healthy living</u> remain widely accepted.
